I have spent the last few years intending to be a special collections librarian or archivist, but after spending one too many hours cooped up in my little cubical at the National Archives removing rusty staples and getting many paper cuts, I am excited to now be pursuing a career in education and especially to have this opportunity to teach the best subject ever: HISTORY!



I first fell in love with history in my early childhood years, in which I kept my summers busy with reading books and playing computer games. One game drew me back into Ancient Egyptian civilization where I mummified the Pharaohs and scavenged through the pyramids. I flew across the globe and skipped through time trying to find the evil Carmen Sandiego and her henchmen.
